Engaged Scholar Award David M. Donahue, Professor of Education, University of San Francisco

David Donahue is a passionate advocate and practitioner of community engaged teaching and research. Currently, he is Professor of Education and from 2015 to 2020 served as Director of the McCarthy Center for Public Service and the Common Good at the University of San Francisco. Before coming to USF in 2015, he was the Interim Provost and Associate Provost at Mills College in Oakland, California, and worked there for more than twenty years as a professor of education where he taught and advised doctoral students, teacher credential candidates, and undergraduates. He is the author of numerous articles, chapters, and presentations on service learning and community engagement as well as two books. Most recently, he is co-author of *The Student Companion to Community-Engaged Learning* (2018) with Star Plaxton-Moore and *Democratic Dilemmas of Teaching Service Learning: Curricular Strategies for Success* (2011) with Christine Cress.


Student Civic Leader Award Sherimae Murro, University of Hawai'l at Mānoa

Engaged Campus Award University of Hawai'i at Mānoa
